Dunn's family settled in the New World first in Bermuda, and then in Turks & Caicos, where she spent her childhood. This was all as a result of the explorations of Thomas Harriott, famed British navigator, explorer and mathematician who in the late 1500s came to the new world with Sir Walter Raleigh and discovered many things that he took back to Great Britain, among them, fresh ginger.

Bringing the story back to local roots, you'll be interested to know that Harriott is also credited with drawing the first map of North Carolina.
